


LEE TURNS BACK TIME

More and more designers are displaying a desire to keep ancient craft techniques alive. These were a few of our favourites from Milan Design Week.

1. Australian designer Brodie Neill has hit the mark with his 'Stellarnova' table collection for Made In Ratio, created from environmentally sustainable bamboo multi-ply. Made of rare zisha clay from Yixing in China, 'The Tea House' ceramic wares by South Africa's Christopher Jenner hark back to 9th-century pottery techniques. Visit christopher-jenner.com. 3. The 'Congruent' series of side tables by Australian designer Jon Goulder combines hand-blown glass with turned Tasmanian blackwood. This is as big as hand-blown glass gets.
