and shapes of my watering can collection, especially the white plaster Paola Navone jugs juxtaposed against the old copper cans. They make a lovely tablescape and wonderful vases, and I really like how they bring a little bit of the outside indoors. When displaying collections, the key thing is to make the most of the different shapes and different heights. You don't want all the objects facing the same way or looking too uniform."

"Ayala Bar is an artist and designer whose jewellery I've been wearing for many years. She makes every piece by hand using tiny fragments of fabrics and beads. The brightly coloured beads remind me of my school days, when we used to swap beads amongst our friends. I'm a big believer in wearing your finery every day – nothing should be saved for a special occasion. I've always longed to look like a gypsy and even though I haven't got dark skin or hair, I love that I can slip one of Ayala's pieces over my head and instantly be transported to another time and place."

## "Boiled wool is one of my all-time

favourite upholstery materials – it's a heavy, woven felt. On this sofa [right] I've used the fabric inside out and overlapped the edges with contrasting patches that bring out the bright colours on the cushions. I never understand why people are so afraid to mix colour and fabrics. I think if you put all the fabrics you love together they'll work in some way, shape or form. There's only one real 'rule': if your room is pattern-heavy, keep the outside of the room plainer by using muted or neutral shades. Other than that, go for your life!"



"Every time I go into a bookstore, I look for my favourite book, *Gone to Earth* by Mary Webb. I've been collecting copies since I was a little girl; I must have a dozen or so now."
